

Department I – Youth Garden

Judging: Thursday, August 7– 10 a.m.
After judging, exhibits will be released except for 1 sample.

Rules

- A. Garden displays must be in place between 8 a.m. and 9:30 a.m. Thursday with exhibit tags completed and attached.
- B. Only one entry per class per exhibitor will be accepted.
- C. Garden products will be judged for use on table. In selecting exhibits the following points shall be considered: condition, characteristics, uniformity of size and color, freedom from blemishes and disease, maturity and variety.
- D. Entries in this department (Youth Gardens) are limited to 4-H members who are enrolled in the 4-H Gardening project or the Primary 4-H Gardening Project for the current 4-H project year. This department (Youth Gardens) is for the display of the **produce only** from the 4-H Gardening Project listed above. (Please note that this department is separate from the 4-H General Project Department which has its own exhibit requirements for the 4-H Gardening Project and the Primary 4-H Gardening Project. See the Kit Carson County 4-H Project Syllabus for rules and classes.) Display in this department (Youth Gardens) is at the discretion of the exhibitor and is **not required** for the completion of the 4-H Gardening Project or the Primary 4-H Gardening Project. Youth exhibitors showing in the open class gardens division must make two separate entries.
- E. Garden exhibitors should furnish their own paper plates.
- F. A CSU manual on selection, preparing and judging vegetables is available to help exhibitors upon request.
